

We maintain a network of over 180 volunteer professional planners, architects, landscape architects, designers, and engagement specialists who are available to help on a range of projects. Applicants include residents, non-profit orgs, local businesses, and local government.








Reimagining the Bank of America Building Community Visioning

Project timeline: October 2020 to March 2021
SFCD partnered with Maggie Walker Community Land Trust
(MWCLT) to lead a community visioning process to receive
feedback and ideas from residents for the new intended use of the
former Bank of America building in the Highland Park community.
The bank building closed in 2017 and ownership was transferred to
the Richmond Land Bank, a program of MWCLT.

In late 2020, SFCD developed a creative digital and physical outreach plan that amplified the ideas that Northside residents had regarding the intended use of the building. Data and responses were collected and presented in a final report for the Maggie Walker Community Land Trust to consider in the development of a Request for Proposal (RFP) for the building.

 SFCD role: Community visioning/engagement strategy, community ambassador coordination, host virtual meetings; launch survey; design/coordinate marketing and outreach materials; develop final guide; consulting with MWCLT.






Reimagining the Bank of America Building

Community Visioning

- Project kick off in fall 2020
- Hired and collaborated with 2 Highland Park resident community ambassadors
- Created engagement timeline; assisted in the design, marketing, and communications to residents
- Assisted in the design and facilitation of virtual meetings (due to Covid-19)
- Launched community survey in Dec. 2020
- Collaborated with team to develop final report and top community recommendations.
- Assisted with MWCLT RFP resources in spring/summer 2022



Highland Grove Community Plan Community Visioning

Project timeline: October 2021 to March 2022

Better Housing Coalition (BHC) collaborated with SFCD to lead a community visioning process to guide the design of outdoor and architectural elements in the plan. Alongside BHC, Richmond Redevelopment and Housing Authority, the City of Richmond, Maggie Walker Community Land Trust, project:HOMES, Richmond Metropolitan Habitat for Humanity, and resident ambassadors, SFCD convened meetings, created a community survey, and hosted open house events that brought affordable housing non-profits under one roof for resource sharing. Over 150 residents participated throughout the process building a strong foundation to help guide BHC's work moving forward.

 SFCD role: Community visioning/engagement strategy, community ambassador coordination, host virtual and in-person community events; launch survey; coordinate marketing and outreach to neighbors; consulting with Better Housing Coalition.

Reconnect Jackson Ward Community Visioning

Project timeline: December 2021 to September 2022
The Virginia Office of Intermodal Planning and Investment
(OIPI), Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT), and the
City of Richmond, undertook a feasibility study to develop
options to reconnect Jackson Ward, a historic African
American neighborhood that has been physically and
economically separated by Interstates 95 and 64 since the
1950s.

Born out of the *Richmond 300* Master Plan's vision for new infrastructure to reconnect Jackson Ward, the Reconnect Jackson Ward Feasibility Study engaged the community to evaluate and develop viable options for new transportation connections and public public spaces spaces in this area.

 SFCD role: Community visioning/engagement strategy, community ambassador coordination, and host Pop-up Events; consulting with Ebony Walden Consulting. Project management team includes OIPI, VDOT, City of Richmond, and WRA.








Reconnect Jackson Ward Community Visioning

In June 2022, The Reconnect Jackson Ward Feasibility Study team unveiled a recommended framework to help "reconnect" Jackson Ward and surrounding neighborhoods, while meeting the ideals of inclusion, unification, access to everyone, and keeping Black history alive.

SFCD assisted the team in developing a strategy for Richmond's application to the Federal Reconnecting Communities Planning Grant opportunity. The City of Richmond submitted the final grant application in October 2022.





Chamberbrook Business and Arts District

Project timeline: January 2022 to September 2022
The Chamberbrook Business & Arts District of
Northside RVA is a grassroots effort by longtime
Richmond residents, community organizers, and
designers.

In 2022, Reach Chances, Inc. received a Virginia Statewide Business District Resurgence Grant to engage with neighbors and develop a guidebook for the future of the Chamberlayne Ave. corridor.

 SFCD role: Community visioning/engagement strategy, community ambassador coordination, host virtual meeting(s) and community event; collaborate on final design guide; consulting with Real Chances, Inc., Hanbury, Tactile Studio, FORM Coalition, and The LIFT Group.







Jackson Ward Community Plan Community Visioning

(January 2022 to November 2023)

The Jackson Ward Community Plan brings Gilpin Court and Jackson Ward residents, planning experts, elected officials, and community members together to reach an informed, shared vision for the future of the neighborhood.

Upon submission to HUD at the end of 2023, Community Plan will be a living document that will be organized and designed to act as a guide for community empowerment and a road map for continued planning and action.

 SFCD role: Community visioning/engagement lead; strategy and collaboration with project team for community visioning events. Project team includes Richmond Redevelopment and Housing Authority, City of Richmond, Richmond City Health District, and LRK architects.
